- Treasury Report: Account balance \$1,329.41; special thank you to Mark for helping the Scanlons get out of their drive during the recent snow storm; the HCA executive board will have a discussion in April regarding an electronic payment option (PayPal) and appropriate email address for managing income and fund disbursement.
- 3. Borough Updates:
 - No refuse pickup on Monday, January 18th, Martin Luther King Day.
 - Penn State Spring Semester begins remote classes on Tuesday, January 19th and expect to convert to in-person classes mid-February.
 - Update on the Neighborhood Coalition and borough staff bi-weekly meetings to discuss COVID related topics, Borough and special group task force activity, and Council agenda – Mark shares timely minutes of the meetings on the HCA LISTSERV.
 - Report on borough staff attrition in planning, engineering, parks and public works; the ABCs have volunteer needs (Authorities Board has 2 open positions, Historical Architectural Review Board (HARB) has 1 open position for a licensed realtor, Transportation Commission has 1 open position, and LGBTQ Advisory Committee has 2 student positions). - Mayor Fllippelli reported the Biden Inaugural Committee asked for communities to join in a national remembrance of COVID deaths at 5:30 pm on January 19th. - Update on Mt. Nittany Medical Center's current COVID patient numbers:
 41 with a rise in the use for ventilators; some elective surgeries are now being allowed.

4. "Awesome Grant Brainstorming" - Dina Liberatore

• 3 Dot as the sponsor, Dina reported on a skill share program (Highlands residents who present a unique skill or interest through a Zoom presentation) for grant funding.
